A thousand young people, youth leaders and Christian youth ministers gathered together in Ely Cathedral on the evening of 15th July for one of this region's largest annual Christian youth events, 'The Rave in the Nave'.

In addition to the usual entertainment that has formed a staple part of this event for almost twenty years, there was a special visitor this year in the form of the Doctor Who's 'Matt Smith' Tardis.

This most famous of British television icons was rushed from filming the 2011 Doctor Who Christmas special to arrive in Ely just in time for our young people to take their own photographs. A few young visitors to the cathedral during the day even had the chance to hold the actual key used by 'The Doctor' in the television show or pose with the Doctor's sonic screwdriver.

The event included worship on the main stage, atmospheric old testament bible readings, ten-minute talks for young people based on major Christian themes, two prayer chapels and training workshops for youth leaders.

The worship was provided by Christian band, 'Empire Nation' and 'top of the bill' was the Christian band, 'Tom & Ollly'. Their act at one point including its drummer standing and balancing upright upon his own set of drums whilst beating out the rhythm.

Meanwhile the cathedral's north and south choir aisles and its high altar area was used as an interactive prayer walk for young people to reflect on the Bible and the impact humanity has made on God's world.

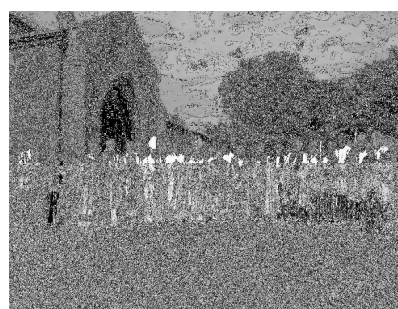
'Rave in the Nave' will return next year.
